1 RULES

- 1.1 Racing will be governed by the Racing Rules of Sailing (RRS).
- 1.2 For IRC classes IRC 2024 Rules apply.
- 1.3 **All Classes**: The organising Authority require all competitors to display a sponsor's flag from the backstay, (or, if not practicable, from the starboard shroud).
- 1.4 Shipping Movements in Narrow Channels
- 1.4.1 It is advisable to monitor Channel 14 when transiting the harbour as large vessels report their progress when entering or leaving the harbour on this channel.
- 1.4.2 Attention is drawn to "INTERNATIONAL REGULATIONS FOR PREVENTING COLLISIONS AT SEA", Rule 9(b), which states "A vessel of less than 20 metres in length or a sailing vessel shall not impede the passage of a vessel which can safely navigate only within a narrow channel or fairway".
- 1.4.3 Failure to observe this rule, while racing or when transiting the harbour may result in the Race Committee or other competitors initiating a protest. The RC or Protest Committee may protest a boat for breach of the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (IRPCAS) or the above regulations on the basis of a report from any source. This changes RRS 60.2(a) and 60.3(a).
- 1.4.4 Penalties for infringement of this rule may extend to disqualification from further races.

2 CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

2.1 Changes to Sailing Instructions will be posted on the Official Notice Board by 08:30 hours on the day they will take effect (See SI 3.1). They may be repeated over the VHF radio up to 5 minutes before the first warning signal of the first race of the day, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 20:00 hours on the day before it will take effect. Should this information differ from the Official Notice Board online (see SI 3.1) then the Official Notice Board takes precedence.

2.2 Where a course area has a WhatsApp group, an amendment may also be posted here. Should this information differ from the Official Notice Board online (see SI 3.1) then the Official Notice Board takes precedence.

3 COMMUNICATION WITH COMPETITORS

- 3.1 Notices to competitors will be posted on the Official Notice Board which is on the Event Website located at <u>https://pooleregatta.co.uk/</u>. These may also be repeated on relevant course WhatsApp Groups. Should this information differ from the Official Notice Board online then the Official Notice Board takes precedence.
- 3.2 On the water (except on Purple course area) the race committee intends to monitor and communicate with competitors via VHF radio. Details of this are given in the relevant course area section of these Sailing Instructions.
- 3.3 All competitors on Red, Green, Pink and Yellow course areas are advised to monitor the appropriate VHF channel and course WhatsApp group (if applicable) from two hours before the warning signal and throughout racing.
- 3.4 Flag L displayed on any Committee Boat means that boats (except on Purple course Area) must listen to the VHF radio for further instructions. This changes RRS "Race Signals".
- 3.5 For classes racing on Purple Course (in-harbour), RRS "Race Signals" Flag L "Afloat" remains unchanged.
- 3.6 See also relevant course area section of Sailing Instructions.

4 CODE OF CONDUCT

- 4.1 *[DP]* Competitors and support persons shall comply with reasonable requests from race officials
- 4.2 *[DP]* Competitors and support persons shall handle the sponsor's flags provided by the organising authority with care, and will make best efforts to return them at the end of the regatta at their berthing area or at the prizegiving.

5 SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- **5.1 Red, Green, Pink and Yellow course areas:** Signals made ashore, e.g. a postponement (and removal of postponement) will be signalled by displaying a timed notice on the Official Notice Board on the Regatta website.
- **5.2** An announcement that a signal such as a postponement is in operation will be made by a VHF broadcast on the course area VHF channel and/or by a notice on a course WhatsApp group. The time of posting on the Official Notice Board will take precedence. This changes RRS Race Signals.
- **5.3 Purple course area:** Signals made ashore will be displayed on the club flagstaffs of Poole Yacht Club and near the slipway at Parkstone Yacht Club.
- **5.4 Purple course only**: When **AP over class flags** is displayed ashore, "1 minute" is replaced with "not less than 30 minutes". This alters RRS "Race Signals".

17 HEARING REQUESTS

- 17.1 **The protest time limit** is 90 minutes after the last boat on the relevant course finishes its last race of the day, or from when the last race of the day is abandoned.
- 17.2 Protests and requests for redress must be submitted in writing within the protest time limit to the Race Office at Parkstone Yacht Club. The preferred methods are either on an electronic form available on the Official Notice Board on the regatta website, https://pooleregatta.co.uk/protest-form/ or on handwritten forms which should be photographed or scanned and emailed to results@pooleregatta.co.uk. Paper protest forms are available from the bar at Poole YC, the bar at Parkstone YC, and the office at Poole Quay Boat Haven.
- 17.3 All hearings will be held at Parkstone Yacht Club. If a party to a hearing has difficulty in attending at the advertised time they should contact <u>results@pooleregatta.co.uk</u> to see whether assistance can be given.

- 17.4 **Hearing Schedule.** Notices will be posted on the Official Notice Board on the event website to inform competitors of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses no later than 30 minutes after the protest time limit.
- 17.5 **Rules Disputes Procedures**. The Post-Race Penalty and Advisory Hearing and RYA Arbitration procedures of the RYA Rules disputes procedures shall apply. The outcome of an RYA arbitration can be referred to a protest committee, but an arbitration cannot be reopened or appealed. See the Official Notice Board for details.

18 SCORING

- **18.1** Two races are required to be completed to constitute a series.
- **18.2** When fewer than four races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores.
- **18.3** When from four to eight races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score.
- **18.4 GBR IRC National Championship.** The scores of boats also eligible for the GBR IRC National Championship (i.e. those with endorsed IRC certificates) will be extracted from the overall IRC regatta results and scored separately
- 18.5 Boats entered for the Dehler Plate and Elan Cup will be scored within their class counting only Dehlers or Elans as appropriate.

19 SAFETY REGULATIONS

- 19.1 Purple course only: Flag Y, displayed over a purple flag ashore or from the committee boat applies to all classes sailing in that course area.
- 19.2 Attention is drawn to Appendix A of these sailing instructions: "Competitor Safety Information".

20 REPLACEMENT OF CREW OR EQUIPMENT

20.1 See relevant course area section of Sailing Instructions.

21 EQUIPMENT AND MEASUREMENT CHECKS

21.1 Equipment and measurement checks may be carried out without notice. The fact that race officials may conduct inspections does not reduce the responsibilities of each competitor as set out in the Notice of Race.

22 SUPPLIED BOATS N/A

23 OFFICIAL VESSELS

23.1 *[NP]* Official vessels will display a coloured flag depending on its allocated Course area.

24 [DP] SUPPORT TEAMS

24.1 Support vessels shall remain at least 100m from the course area while racing is in progress.

25 TRASH DISPOSAL

25.1 All trash shall be taken ashore and disposed of appropriately.

26 [DP] BERTHING

26.1 Boats shall be kept in their daily assigned place whilst in their marina.

27 [DP] HAUL-OUT RESTRICTIONS

27.1 Except for Flying Fifteen class, boats shall not be hauled out during the regatta unless with the written permission of the Race Committee.

28 DIVING EQUIPMENT AND PLASTIC POOLS

28.1 Breathing apparatus shall not be used from the first warning signal to the end of the regatta without the written permission of the Race Committee.

29 PRIZES

29.1 Prizes to be awarded as described in NoR 24.

- 29.2 International Paint and our other Sponsors are keen to see competitors other than the race winners receiving prizes, so random prizes will be awarded it is in your interest to attend both the daily prize giving and the overall prize giving.
- **29.3 Daily Race Prizes:** Prizes will be awarded daily during each evening's social function (see Social Programme). If not collected by the winning boat, the prize will be awarded to the highest–placed boat attending.
- **30 RISK STATEMENT** (to be read in conjunction with **Appendix 1** of these Sailing Instructions) Rule 3 of the Racing Rules of Sailing states: "The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone".

Sailing is by its nature an unpredictable sport and therefore inherently involves an element of risk. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:

- (a) They are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event.
- (b) They are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and other property, whether afloat or ashore.
- (c) They accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own actions or omissions.
- (d) Their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate.
- (e) The provision of a race management team, patrol boats and other officials and volunteers by the event organising authority does not relieve them of their own responsibilities.
- (f) The provision of patrol boat cover is limited to such assistance, particularly in extreme weather conditions, as can be practically provided in the circumstances.
- (g) It is their responsibility to familiarise themselves with any risks, regulations and/or bye-laws specific to sailing or racing in Poole Harbour and Poole Bay including:
 - a. Tidal conditions which are complex with areas of shallow water common as well as very fast tidal flows in parts of the harbour and around the entrance.
 - b. The area is used by a wide variety of craft, including large commercial vessels restricted in their ability to manoeuvre, a chain ferry in the harbour entrance which has priority over other traffic and, at times, high volumes of leisure boat traffic. The Convention on the International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea (COLREG) 1972 and local byelaws apply to all these craft including racing yachts.
 - c. The Sail Racing Procedures issued by Poole Harbour Commissioners, <u>https://www.phc.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2023/05/Poole-Harbour-Sail-Racing-Procedures-Version-9-March-2023.pdf</u> which place requirements on all those involved in yacht racing in Poole.
- (h) They are responsible for ensuring that their boat is equipped and seaworthy so as to be able to face extremes of weather; that there is a crew sufficient in number, experience and fitness to withstand such weather; and that the safety equipment is properly maintained, stowed and in date and is familiar to the crew.

29 INSURANCE

29.1 Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £3,000,000 per incident or equivalent.

3. COMMUNICATION WITH COMPETITORS

- **3.7. VHF RADIO** Communications will be made by the race committee on VHF 77. This may include confirmation of any of the following: time checks, race area, schedule changes, starting order of classes, location of race committee vessel, alternate preparatory signals, courses, change of courses, shortening, postponement, abandonment, starting signals, recalls, next start sequence, times of finishers (to calculate time limits).
- 3.8. In addition to RRS 29.1, individual recalls may be broadcast on VHF. Delay or failure to broadcast or receive a recalled sail number or boat name shall not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).
- 3.9. If the race committee displays flag O (Oscar), alternate VHF channel 6 will be used.
- 3.10. **COURSE WhatsApp GROUP:** The Race Committee will provide details of its intentions at 08:30, for the number and type of course to be sailed each day, using the course WhatsApp group and VHF 77. Sign-up details of the WhatsApp group will be provided at registration. Failure to receive WhatsApp messages shall not be grounds for redress and changes RRS62.1(a).
- 3.11. [DP] From the first warning signal until the end of the last race of the day, except in an emergency, a boat shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats.

6. SCHEDULE OF RACES

- 6.2. The intended race programme (max. 8 races) is set out below. This may be adjusted if there is a need to complete the full race programme.
- 6.3. The time of the first start is given below. Subsequent races will start as soon as possible after the previous race.
- 6.4. To alert boats that a race or sequence of races will begin soon, the orange flag will be displayed on the Committee Boat with one sound signal at least five minutes before a warning signal is made.
- 6.5. The expected order of starting is IRC 0, IRC 1, IRC 2, with the warning signal for the next class being displayed no sooner than one minute after the start of the previous class.
- 6.6. No warning signal will be made after 13:30 on Monday 27 May.

12. THE START

12.2. The starting line will be between the main mast on the Committee Vessel flying an orange flag, and the course side of an outer distance mark which will be an orange cylindrical inflatable buoy. (This buoy may be replaced by a committee vessel, with a staff displaying an orange flag to denote the outer end of the line.)

13. CHANGE TO NEXT LEG OF THE COURSE

- 13.2. To change the next leg of a windward leeward course, the Race Committee may move the original mark as soon as practicable, substitute another mark or move the finish line.
- 13.3. In addition to Rule 33, the Race Committee will use VHF radio and WhatsApp to assist in communicating the change of the next leg of the course. Delay or failure to broadcast or receive broadcast shall not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1 (a).

14. THE FINISH

- 14.2. The finishing line will be between the main mast on a Committee vessel which will fly a blue flag, and either the course side of an inflatable buoy or a buoy defined in the course confirmation. (This buoy may be replaced by a Race Committee vessel with a staff displaying a blue flag which denotes the outer end of the line.)
- 14.3. Competitors should be aware that the race committee may shorten any race in accordance with RRS 32.

16. TIME LIMITS AND TARGET TIMES

- 16.2. The Mark 1 Time Limit, Race Time Limit (see RRS 35), and the Finishing Window are shown in the table below.
- 16.3.

- 16.4. If no boat has passed the first mark within the Mark 1 Time Limit, the race will be abandoned.
- 16.5. Boats failing to finish within the Finishing Window, and not subsequently retiring, penalised or given redress, will be scored Time Limit Expired (TLE) without a hearing. A boat scored TLE shall be scored points for the finishing place one more than the points scored by the last boat that finished within the Finishing Window. This changes RRS 35, A5.1, A5.2 and A10.
- 16.6. Failure to meet the Target Time will not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).

- **3.12. VHF RADIO** Communications will be made by the race committee on VHF M2. Such communications may include confirmation of any of the following: time checks, race area, schedule changes, starting order of classes, location of race committee vessel, alternate preparatory signals, courses, change of courses, shortening, postponement, abandonment, starting signals, recalls, next start sequence, times of finishers (to calculate time limits) and any other information that may assist competitors and race committee in the efficient and fair running of racing.
- **3.13.** In addition to RRS 29.1, individual recalls may be broadcast on VHF. Delay or failure to broadcast or receive a recalled sail number or boat name shall not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).
- 3.14. If the race committee displays IC 'O' (Oscar), alternate VHF channel 06 will be used.
- 3.15. **COURSE WhatsApp GROUP**. The Race Committee will provide details of its intentions by 08:30, for the number of races and type of course to be sailed each day, using the course WhatsApp group. Sign-up details of the WhatsApp group will be provided at registration. Failure to receive WhatsApp messages shall not be grounds for redress and changes RRS62.1(a).
- 3.16. [DP] From the first warning signal until the end of the last race of the day, except in an emergency, a boat shall not make voice or data transmissions and shall not receive voice or data communication that is not available to all boats.

- 6.7. The intended race programme (max. 8 races) is set out below. This may be adjusted if there is a need to complete the full race programme.
- 6.8. The time of the first start is given below. Subsequent races will start as soon as possible after the previous race.
- 6.9. To alert boats that a race or sequence of races will begin soon, the orange flag will be displayed on the Committee Boat with one sound signal at least five minutes before a warning signal is made. The Race Committee will broadcast its racing intentions on VHF M2 as soon as these have been determined and when appropriate for the fleet concerned. Please keep a listening watch on VHF M2.
- 6.10. No warning signal will be made after 1330 on Monday 27 May.
- 6.11. The expected order of starting is VPRS 1, IRC 3, with the warning signal for the next class being displayed no sooner than one minute after the start of the previous class.
- 6.12. No warning signal will be made after 13:30 on Monday 27 May.







- **14.13.** When a boat finishes in accordance with SI 14.12, she shall be awarded a finishing place after all boats that were ahead of her on the race course.

16. TIME LIMITS AND TARGET TIMES

16.15. Laid Course Area

16.15.1. The Mark 1 Time Limit, Race Time Limit (see RRS 35), and the Finishing Window are shown in the table below.

Mark 1 time limit	20 minutes
Race Time limit	75 minutes
Finishing window	15 minutes

- 16.15.2. If no boat has passed the first mark within the Mark 1 Time Limit, the race will be abandoned. The Finishing Window is the time for boats to finish after the first boat sails the course and finishes. Boats failing to finish within the Finishing Window, and not subsequently retiring, penalised or given redress, will be scored Time Limit Expired (TLE) without a hearing. A boat scored TLE shall be scored points for the finishing place two more than the points scored by the last boat that finished within the Finishing Window. This changes RRS 35, A5.1, A5.2 and A10.
- 16.15.3. Failure to meet the Target Time will not be grounds for redress. This changes RRS 62.1(a).

16.16. Shrimper Class

16.16.1. The time limit will be 3 hours after the start signal. This will be extended to include any boat finishing within 30 minutes of the first boat to finish.

19. SAFETY REGULATIONS

19.3. Class specific rules apply for personal floatation. The race officer encourages all fleets to wear at all times on the water, especially as safety cover is limited to and from the race course area

Appendix A

Competitor Safety Information

Competitors should be aware of the following local hazards which they may encounter when transiting to the race course areas.

1) Shallow sandbanks within the harbour

a. Competitors should observe navigation markers and where available navigate in the small ships sections of the marked shipping channels.

2) Harbour Commercial traffic

- a. All competitors must keep clear of large commercial traffic at all times. If a boat impedes the passage of a large commercial vessel she may be subject to disqualification from the event. (See SI 1.4)
- **b.** The space between any commercial vessel and its guard boat which may carry the U flag is a prohibited space, 500 metres is the minimum distance for crossing ahead of such craft.
- **c.** Competitors are required to keep clear of large vessels which can only navigate within the Middle Ship Channel within Poole Harbour and the Swash Channel outside the harbour.
- **d.** VHF Channel 14, used by Poole Harbour Control should be monitored when transiting the harbour channels and entrance.

3) The Harbour entrance

- a. The harbour entrance is the most hazardous area of the harbour and special vigilance and care are required when passing through. It is only 300 metres wide with very strong tidal streams especially at spring ebb. With a slow moving chain ferry and semi hidden chains, strength of tide and possible wind shadow from the land and heavy traffic, constant vigilance is required.
- b. All boats with engines must have their engines ready when passing through the harbour entrance.
- c. Competitors must anticipate the chain ferry movements. Its direction of travel is indicated by a black ball hoisted at the forward end approximately half a minute before departure and a white flashing light.
- d. The chain ferry has right of way. Keep clear of the chain ferry when it is crossing and avoid passing ahead. Remember! The ferry can do very little to get out of your way!
- **e.** Ferry crossing times are on the hour from Haven Hotel starting at 07:00, and from Studland starting at 07:10, then every twenty minutes. In busy times a continuous shuttle is run.

4) East Looe Channel, Hook Sands

- a. Boats racing on Red, Green and Pink course areas should be aware of the depth restrictions in the East Looe Channel. The sandbanks in this area move around and charted depths may be inaccurate. This channel should only be used cautiously following a careful consideration of the likely depth of water.
- **b.** The Hook Sands extend southwards from the E Looe Channel. Care should be taken to ensure that there is enough depth for boats transiting to and from the race area south of the Hook Sands

5) Training Bank

a. Boats racing on Yellow course area should be aware of the Training Bank which is a line of marked rocks that runs on the West side of the Swash channel, and should ensure that they have cleared the furthest marker before turning into Studland Bay.

6) Poole Harbour Sail Racing Procedures
