

# BRITISH HOBIE NATIONALS 2021

## SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

**Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> August to Monday 30<sup>th</sup> August 2021**

**Organising Authority - Poole Yacht Club**

**Poole Harbour, UK**

### 1. RULES

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in The Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-2024 and IHCA Class Rules.
- 1.2 The Poole Harbour Bye Laws and Poole Harbour Yacht Racing Criteria. [https://www.phc.co.uk/leisure\\_yacht.html](https://www.phc.co.uk/leisure_yacht.html) will apply.
- 1.3 The International Regulations for Prevention of Collisions at sea (in appropriate circumstances, e.g. Meeting commercial traffic, and yachts not involved in racing) will apply.
- 1.4 Adequate personal buoyancy must be worn by all competitors when afloat, except briefly while changing or adjusting clothing or personal equipment. Neither a wet suit nor a dry suit constitutes adequate personal buoyancy. Flag Y will not be displayed. This changes RRS 40.
- 1.5 IHCA Class Rule Penalty Policy shall apply <http://hobieclass.com/wp-content/uploads/2019/11/IHCA-penalties-related-to-class-rule-violations-1-1.docx>
- 1.6 RRS 44.1 is changed so that the Two-Turns Penalty is replaced by the One-Turns Penalty
- 1.7 In RRS 44.2 insert after the first sentence: "However, if Mark O is set as an Offset mark, a boat may take a penalty for an incident in the zone around Mark A or on the leg between Mark A and Mark O, as soon as possible after leaving the zone around Mark O."

### 2. NOTICES TO COMPETITORS

- 2.1 Notices to competitors will be posted on the online official notice board located at <https://www.pooleyc.co.uk/> and physically on a supplementary noticeboard outside the academy room next to the race office during the event.

### 3. CHANGES TO SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

- 3.1 Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted on the official notice board at least 1 hour before the advertised start time of the first race to which the change applies, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 2000hrs on the day before it will take effect.

### 4. SIGNALS MADE ASHORE

- 4.1 Signals made ashore will be displayed from the official flagpole situated on southside of the main club house.
- 4.2 When flag AP is displayed ashore, '1 minute' is replaced with 'not less than 30 minutes' in race signal AP. This changes Flag AP in Race Signals.

### 5. SCHEDULE OF RACES

- 5.1 A maximum of 9 races is planned.
- 5.2 Up to 4 races may be sailed on one day.
- 5.3 Racing is scheduled as follows: -

Day	Warning Signal for first race
Saturday 28 <sup>th</sup> August 2021	not before 11:55 hrs
Sunday 29 <sup>th</sup> August 2021	not before 10:55 hrs
Monday 30 <sup>th</sup> August 2021	not before 10:55 hrs

- 5.4 To alert boats that sequence of races will begin soon, the orange starting line flag will be displayed with one sound at least five minutes before the first warning signal of the day is made.
- 5.5 When back-to-back races are to be held, the Race Committee Signals Vessel will display the L flag at the finish line. The warning signal for the next race will be made as soon as practicable after the finish of the preceding race.
- 5.6 There will be No Warning signal made after 1455 on the last day of racing, except after a General Recall.

**6. CLASS FLAG**

- 6.1 Class flag for Hobie 16 shall be a Yellow Hobie Class Flag.

**7. RACING AREAS**

- 7.1 The normal racing area will be an area known as The Top Triangle, (shown below as Balls Lake)



**8. THE COURSES**

- 8.1 The International Hobie Cat Class Courses will be used as shown in Attachment A.
- 8.2 No later than the warning signal, the race committee signal vessel will display the Course to be sailed.
- 8.3 All marks, except gates are to be left to port.
- 8.4 When there is a gate, boats shall sail between the gate marks from the direction of the previous mark and round either gate mark. If only one gate mark is in position, that mark shall be rounded to port.
- 8.5 The offset mark, if used, is defined as a passing mark. It applies both at the beginning of downwind legs and at reaches.
- 8.6 Each race target time is 40 to 45 minutes for the first boat.
- 8.7 The course may be shortened and if so the following shall apply:  
A boat flying Flag F at a mark and making repeated sound signals, means 'after rounding this mark (including any offset mark), boats should proceed directly to the finish line'. If flown at a leeward gate means 'after passing through the gate, proceed direct to the finish line.' This changes RRS 32.1 and 32.2. Flag 'S' may also be flown from the Committee Boat and/or the mark rounding boat.

**9. THE MARKS**

- 9.1 Course marks will be orange cylindrical buoys
- 9.2 The Offset mark if used will be a small red buoy.

- 9.3 The weather mark may be: a combination of orange cylindrical buoy with small red Offset mark in which case both will be left to port; or 2 orange cylindrical marks of equal size in which they should be treated as a gate and boats shall sail between the marks from the direction of the previous mark and round either gate mark.
- 9.4 The start line marks are the staff on the committee vessel displaying an orange flag at the starboard end and an orange danbuoy displaying an orange flag at the port end.
- 9.5 The finish line marks are the staff on the committee vessel displaying a blue flag and an orange danbuoy displaying a blue flag.

#### **10. Not Used**

#### **11. THE START**

- 11.1 Races will be started by using Rule 26 of the RRS with the warning signal given 5 minutes before the starting signal.
- 11.2 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the committee boat at the starboard end and the course side of the port-end starting mark.
- 11.3 A boat that does not start within 5 minutes of her starting signal will be scored DNS without a hearing. This changes RRS Appendix A5.
- 11.4 Minimum wind conditions: No race will be started in under 5 knots of wind at all marks of the course as determined by the Race Committee.

#### **12. CHANGE OF THE NEXT LEG OF THE COURSE**

- 12.1 The race committee may change the position of the next mark in accordance with RRS.33

#### **13. THE FINISH**

- 13.1 The Finishing Line will be between the staff on the committee boat displaying a blue flag and an orange danbuoy mark displaying a blue flag at the outer end (depending on the course configuration used the committee boat may be the port or starboard end finishing mark).
- 13.2 When approximately half of the boats in a race have rounded the last mark, the Race Committee may at its absolute discretion award finishing points (FPA) to boats not yet finished that remain on the course. A boat that is still racing may be notified of this by a committee vessel (which may be in motion) displaying flag W with one sound signal. A boat so notified is no longer required to sail the course (changing RRS 28.1), shall stop racing and shall return to the starting area, or return ashore if there is no more racing. Failure to take advantage of this provision may result in any following back to back race being started before that competitor has returned to the starting area. This shall not be the basis for a redress request under rule 62(a). This changes RRS 28.1 and 35.

#### **14. PENALTY SYSTEM**

- 14.1 Rules 44.1 is changed so that only One Turn Penalty, including one tack and one gybe, is required.
- 14.2 The IHCA Class Rule Penalty Policy will be utilised.

#### **15. TIME LIMITS**

- 15.1 The time limit for the first boat in each race shall be 90 minutes.
- 15.2 The target time for the first boat will be 45minutes.
- 15.3 Mark 1 time limit: 30 minutes.
- 15.4 Boats failing to finish within 30 minutes after the first boat finishes, will be scored Did Not Finish without a hearing. This changes RRS 35 and Appendix A4 and A5

#### **16. PROTESTS AND REQUESTS FOR REDRESS**

- 16.1 Protest forms are available at the race office. Protests shall be delivered there within the protest time limit.
- 16.2 The protest time limit is 60 minutes after the last boat has finished the last race of the day or the race committee signals no more racing today, whichever is later.
- 16.3 The same protest time limit applies to all protests by the race committee and to requests for redress. This changes RRS 61.3 & 62.2.

#### **17. SCORING**

- 17.1 The Low Points scoring system of RRS Appendix A will apply.
- 17.2 Three races are required to be completed to constitute a series.
- 17.3 Ties will be broken in accordance with RRS Appendix A8.
- 17.4 When less than 4 races have been completed, a boat's score will be the total of her race scores. When 4 or more races have been completed, a boat's score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score.

#### **18. SAFETY REGULATIONS**

- 18.1 A boat that retires from a race shall notify the race committee as soon as possible.
- 18.2 Poole Harbour is a Commercial Port and commercial shipping movements can be expected. Details of known Shipping Movements, day by day during the Event, will be displayed on the Official Notice Board.

- 18.3 A tally system will be in operation. The tally board will be in the vicinity of the Poole Yacht Club clubhouse, immediately outside the changing rooms.
- 18.4 Failure to comply with safety/tally system will have them scored DNF for the last race started by them of the session they didn't comply.

#### **19. REPLACEMENT OF CREW OR EQUIPMENT**

- 19.1 Substitution of competitors will not be allowed without the prior written approval of the race committee (relative weights will be taken into account).
- 19.2 Substitution of damaged or lost equipment will not be allowed unless authorized by the race committee. Requests for substitution shall be made to the committee at the first reasonable opportunity.

#### **20. EQUIPMENT AND MEASUREMENT CHECKS**

- 20.1 A boat, equipment or crew may be inspected at any time for compliance with the class rules and sailing instructions. On the water, a boat shall comply with an instruction by a Race Committee measurer to proceed immediately to a designated area for inspection.
- 20.2 Whenever possible, competitors should be warned of potential equipment violations on the beach before racing when observed by other competitors, the protest committee, or regatta officials.
- 20.3 With the approval from World Sailing as allowed by RRS 87 CHANGES TO CLASS RULES, the IHCA has changed the following class rules:

Delete General Rule 18.1 and replace with: *A competitor may carry or wear a maximum of 10 KG of clothing and equipment. Additionally, the trapeze harness shall weigh no more than 3.0 KG as allowed by RRS 50.1 (b)*  
Tiger & Wildcat add new: *C.4.3 (a) Trapeze harness. The weight shall not exceed 3.0 kg, as allowed by RRS 50.1 (b).*

#### **21. PRIZES**

- 21.1 Prizes are awarded at the discretion of the Class Association. Details may be displayed on the Official Notice Board

#### **22. DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY**

- 22.1 Competitors participate in the regatta entirely at their own risk. See RRS 3, Decision to Race. The organising authority will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during, or after the regatta.

#### **23. INSURANCE**

- 23.1 Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum of £3,000,000 per Incident or the equivalent.

#### **24. RADIO COMMUNICATION**

- 24.1 Except in an emergency, a boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications not available to all boats. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones.

#### **25. TRASH DISPOSAL**

- 25.1 Competitors are reminded of the Basic Principles of Environmental Responsibility in the RRS
- 25.2 Trash may be placed aboard support or official boats.

#### **IHCA SAFETY NOTES TO THE SAILORS:**

##### **GENERAL**

If wind, wave, or water conditions make you doubtful of your ability to handle the conditions, retire from the race.

##### **TRAPEZE HARNESES**

Sailors are strongly recommended to use trapeze harnesses with a quick release hookless system or a quick release hook, which meets the ISO 10862 standard.

##### **HELMETS**

If sailors wish to wear head protection it is strongly recommend they use helmets of European standard EN1385.

##### **ELECTRICAL POWER LINES – AVOID!!!**

Before raising the mast, and always while sailing, check for and avoid low overhead electrical power lines. If you see a power line, AVOID IT! A MAST COMING IN CONTACT OR EVEN NEAR AN ELECTRICAL POWER LINE CAN CAUSE SERIOUS INJURY OR DEATH TO PEOPLE ON OR TOUCHING THE BOAT!

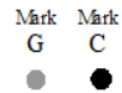
